Wade</i>, the Supreme Court decision that allows abortion for any reason.</p> <p>"I think <i>Roe v. Wade</i> was bad law and bad medical science. Wade</i> return to the states....I don't believe the...Court should be legislating in the way that they did on <i>Roe v. That's not a good health decision."</p>	<p>"My convictions regarding the sanctity of life have always been clear and consistent, without equivocation or wavering. I believe that <i>Roe v. Wade</i> should be overturned."</p>	<p><b>Signed</b> the Arkansas Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act into law.</p> <p>"I applaud the Court's action [in <i>Gonzales v. Carhart</i>], which also sends a strong reminder that we must stay vigilant in our cause to protect those who cannot protect themselves."</p>

And it's...why we're going to send them packing in January 2009, and return progressive leadership to the White House."</p>	<p>Voted <b>to endorse</b> <i>Roe v. Wade</i>, the Supreme Court decision that allows abortion for any reason.</p> <p>Co-sponsor of the "Freedom of Choice Act."</p> <p>"I strongly support <i>Roe v.  <p><b>Barack Obama</b> U.S. Senator from Illinois</p> <p>Standing in Rasmussen Public Opinion Poll as of October 7, 2007: <b>26%</b></p>	<p>Voted <b>in favor of</b> funding research that requires killing human embryos.</p> <p>"Embryonic stem cells can be obtained from a number of sources, including in vitro fertilization. ...We should expand and accelerate research using these embryos..."</p>	<p>Co-sponsor of the "Freedom of Choice Act."</p> <p>"I have consistently advocated for reproductive choice and will make preserving women's rights under <i>Roe v. Wade</i> a priority as President."</p>	<p>"I am extremely concerned that [<i>Gonzales v. Carhart</i>] will embolden state legislatures to enact further measures to restrict a woman's right to choose, and that the conservative Supreme Court justices will look for other opportunities to erode <i>Roe v. Wade</i>."</p>
 <p><b>John Edwards</b> Former U.S. Senator from North Carolina</p> <p>Standing in Rasmussen Public Opinion Poll as of October 7, 2007: <b>12%</b></p>	<p>"I will do absolutely everything in my power to make sure that America as a nation is funding embryonic stem cell research."</p>	<p>Voted <b>to endorse</b> <i>Roe v. Wade</i>, the Supreme Court decision that allows abortion for any reason.</p> <p>"I have always supported a woman's constitutional right to...reproductive choices."</p>	<p>Voted <b>against</b> the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act.</p> <p>"I could not disagree more strongly with today's [<i>Gonzales v. Carhart</i>] decision....This...is a stark reminder of why Democrats cannot afford to lose the 2008 election."</p>
 <p><b>Bill Richardson</b> Governor of New Mexico</p> <p>Standing in Rasmussen Public Opinion Poll as of October 7, 2007: <b>4%</b></p>	<p>"Congress must maintain pressure...to expand federal funding for the National Institutes of Health to conduct research on embryonic stem cell lines."</p>	<p>"The [<i>Gonzales v.  <p><b>Joe Biden</b> U.S. Senator from Delaware</p> <p>Standing in Rasmussen Public Opinion Poll as of October 7, 2007: <b>3%</b></p>	<p>Voted <b>in favor of</b> funding research that requires killing human embryos.</p> <p>In a 2004 letter to the President, co-signed with 57 other Senators, urged the President to "expand the current federal policy concerning embryonic stem cell research."</p>	<p>Voted <b>to endorse</b> <i>Roe v. Wade</i>, the Supreme Court decision that allows abortion for any reason.</p> <p>"I strongly support <i>Roe v. Wade</i>."</p>	<p>Voted <b>for</b> the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act.</p> <p>Has subsequently stated: "I am a long-standing supporter of <i>Roe v. Wade</i> and a woman's right to choose. The Supreme Court's intellectually dishonest and paternalistic opinion in <i>Gonzales v. Carhart</i> makes clear that the Bush-appointed conservative majority is tipping the scales against <i>Roe</i>."</p>

 <p><b>Christopher Dodd</b> U.S. Senator from Connecticut</p> <p>Standing in Rasmussen Public Opinion Poll as of October 7, 2007: <b>1%</b></p>	<p>Voted <b>in favor of</b> funding research that requires killing human embryos.</p> <p>"Stem cell research turns embryos that would otherwise be discarded into the seeds...of science."</p>	<p>Voted <b>to endorse</b> <i>Roe v. Wade</i>, the Supreme Court decision that allows abortion for any reason.</p> <p>"I have always believed in a woman's right to choose....For 26 years in the U.S. Senate, I have never wavered in defending a woman's right to choose – and I never will."</p>	<p>Voted <b>against</b> the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act.</p> <p>"I am deeply troubled by today's [<i>Gonzales v. Wade</i>, which upholds this principle."</p>	<p>"I am opposed to today's Supreme Court ruling [in <i>Gonzales v. Carhart</i>] or any ruling that places restrictions on reproductive freedom."</p>
